• Correctly 'Water Keepers' in law

• No power in law

No power to check rod licences







Powers

- Enforce internal club rules
- Citizen's power of arrest (indictable offences)
- Police/CPS advice: 'only in extreme cases'

Environment Agency: rod licensing & byelaws

Police: criminal offences

Reporting

- Date
- Time
- Place
- Incident
- Offenders



• Evidence of offence, e.g. dead fish, tackle







Evidence of Identity

- Number of offenders
- Description
- Height, build, colour, gait, hair colour/length/style
- Accent
- Clothing
- Footwear
- Vehicle: make, colour, VRN, location
- Contact details







Helpful Rules

- All members to possess a current rod licence and produce upon demand to club bailiff
- No litter
- No fires
- Permit must be produced upon demand and carried by member whilst fishing
- No fish to be introduced or taken without relevant permissions
- No illegal drugs or alcohol abuse
- Contravention of club rules likely to lead to expulsion
